Life, love and beauty

Navajo artist and sculptor Ed Natiya Saxon comes from a very proud and noble heritage. His Navajo name, Natiya, was given to him at birth and means "everywhere; all over; at once." A family name, it was passed down to him from his late grandfather. Today, following in the footsteps of his rich and diverse family legacy, Natiya is quickly becoming one of the top Native American artists in the country.

Natiya has been represented by HueysFineArt in Santa Fe for the past year. Starting at the end of November, Natiya will begin an artistic journey becoming the gallery's Artist in Residence for a yearlong project as he turns his

popular sculpture *Chiefs of the Wind* into a 14-foot monument.

"All year long visitors can come to the gallery and watch how the piece is being created," says Natiya. "People are more than welcome to come in and see me and the sculpture."

Chiefs of the Wind has been very successful in its original size at 50 inches, and Natiya says the piece lends itself well to be designed as a monument. Several collectors are already interested in the work, and the *Chiefs of the Wind* monument will be available in a limited edition of 9.

Natiya has received numerous awards for his artwork not only in New Mexico, but also throughout the United States.

He currently sculpts full time and lives in Albuquerque, New Mexico, with his two little girls, Ivory and Avonlee. Natiya's strong Navajo roots have kept him grounded as well as inspired with creation. 🌿
